Back in 2008, I was looking online trying to find information to explain the way I see all these people including my parents and family are all programmed and wearing color clothing that seems to correlate like they are following something to do with the colors of the pentagram....

Then I got sidetracked ... or perhaps I wasn't?

Came across a website that had a listing of some of the magicians or witches of the past. Saw Aleister Crowley and others and then.......... George Pickingill

I paused on him and stared at that picture of him. Felt pulled by the picture. Then I read the article on him in there. He was an intriguing person. Then I was surprised that there was not much detail about his life.

There were a lot of stuff that can be found on him since he was living in the 19th and early 20th century. So I got pulled into studying him on and off since 2008 till now 16 years later in 2024.

Again back to 2008. Soon I was checking the internet for any references on George Pickingill and I came to a reference to a forum that is now defunct, I clicked on it and it was like I came crashing through the ceiling into a middle of a major debate going on the subject of George Pickingill.

On one side was all the unruly members and the forum moderators. It was like there was a big moderating failure going on continuously. The failure of the moderating is what drove many people away from that forum eventually and led to the forum's demise.

On the other side was 'Barbarosa' who was Bill Liddell and 'Scott' and 'Froglover', they were trying to make the case for the Pickingill side of things.

I always liked the way Bill Liddell was explaining things in a nice friendly way and I was disgusted at the way the other side was. It was like they didn't want to debate at all. Looking back, I think I saw the way younger people were becoming, which explains the total lack of debating in today's world.

I became friends with them. Had communicated with Bill Liddell a couple of times. He passed on 19 March 2020. That night, I posted his funeral notice picture on my Facebook page. And a little later that night, I heard three shotgun blasts. It was very loud and very near.

I always knew that I would being checking out the stuff about his story. But as he said, that he changed his name before he began writing his articles.

It was difficult researching with records of New Zealand and Australia, not much available. They don't have any censuses as they destroyed them after the totals were tallied up. Birth, Marriage, and Death records are kept private until like it is a hundred years after the birth, etc.

Then later, I made a major breakthrough and got his birth name. I was surprise I was able to find some information in the Australian Government Gazette. Bill Liddell was a clerk for the government and these gazettes announces promotions etc. So I was able to track where he was during the 1950's to 1960's in Australia.

The New Zealand Government Gazettes of the 1960's to 1980's don't seem to be online yet. But was able to track his whereabouts in the 1960's to 1970's in the New Zealand Electoral rolls.

I now have found the first possible evidence of him being in Scotland and England in 1962. Perhaps as more passenger records comes online we may find more records of him being in United Kingdom.

I think in Bill Liddell's case he was protecting the identity of his Elders. We know that Sylvia Tatham was one of his Elders and she was born in England.

Some of the information that Bill Liddell wrote about probably came from contacts that Sylvia knew in England.

He may have got the Pickingill information through those Elders or contacts.

I have proven the case that he did changed his name and that he did had a paternal great-grandfather and paternal great-great grandfather that lived in Essex at the time of George Pickingill's life.

Also, I always believe that there is the sub-conscious collective mind (SCCM). You can say the Borg story line in the Star Trek sagas is similar, they all are connected to the collective mind.

I think when many of the witches and magicians of the past were destroyed, some of their thoughts and memory are still in the SCCM.

Then people in later generations who are psychic or magical in spirit can eventually tap into that SCCM and draw thoughts from the witches and magicians of the past.

It could be also how Bill Liddell got the rituals that became part of the covens that he created.

As I mentioned, this is only the beginning work on Bill Liddell. Hopefully that more documents comes out later and that perhaps some of the people that knew him will add some stories or photos about him.







After this point there is no more references found concerning Graham Alfred Irwin Moss. He disappeared from the records.

Graham Moss' interest in witchcraft began in the 1950's. In the early 1960's, he wanted to become an initiate of Gardnerian Wicca tradition so he can learn what kind of rituals they used.

It seems like as early as 1962, he intended to move to New Zealand and wanted to have a different name so he can be able to travel and write anonymously.

He abandoned his life as Graham Moss and disappeared.

Seeing that Graham Moss was an ore sampler before and worked in the Mines department. He probably had gotten the gold rush bug and liked going to the gold mines.

It is more than likely Graham Moss became friends with a man with the name of Ernie Liddell.

His whole name was Ernest William Liddell an Electrical Mechanic who lives and works in the Nobles Nob Mine in Tennant Creek. He was born 10 July 1937.

Ernie Liddell probably let Graham Moss use his identity when he left.

Events in England

~ 27 September 1962

A newspaper reporter met Alex Sanders and his Priestess Ardraea (real name mentioned as Pat) and they discussed their upcoming midnight witch wedding.

Ardraea was Pat Kopinski of Nottingham.

From the newspaper, Manchester Evening News, Thursday, September 27, 1962:

Midnight wedding for witch couple

Evening News Reporter

I have been invited to witness what is said to be the most remarkable witchcraft ritual ever performed in this country --- the wedding of a "High Priest" and his "Priestess."

They will be married in the nude by century-old rites at a massive granite "altar" at Alderley Edge Cheshire, early next year.

And at midnight recently 36-year-old Alex Sanders, "High Priest" of Manchester's coven of ten witches, introduced me to his blonde, bride-to-be, High Priestess Ardraea.

NO REGRETS

"We were destined to meet and marry," said Ardraea, who had travelled from her home in Nottingham for another midnight "ceremony."

Their fantastic moonlight wedding will begin at midnight on their "Festival of the Yule."

But last night, Ardraea --- her real name is Pat --- refused to disclose her full identity or to be photographed.

She did revealed: "I am the daughter of a minister. My family's name is well-known but I am not prepared to say what religion I was until after my marriage to Alex."

Ardraea --- this is the name of their pagan Goddess of Love and Laughter which she has now adopted --- went on: "I had a strict Christian upbringing on account of my father, but now I am converted to witchcraft.

"When I marry Alex it will mean a complete break with my family, but I have no regrets."

Ardraea said she did not have a job but travelled the country visiting friends. "My father provides me with money," she said. "When my parents learn the truth about my new life they will be very shocked and there is bound to be some embarrassment for them, but it can't be avoided."

The importance of this newspaper article is that it proved that Alex Sanders and Pat Kopinski did planned to get married. Proving the information from the letters written by Bill Liddell.

~ 4 November 1962

There was an interesting letter written from Eleanor Ray Bone to Gerald Gardner dated 4 November 1962. In it there is some about a New Zealander man that wanted to get in the craft.

He was staying at Monique Wilson (Olwen) in Perth, Scotland for a couple of weeks before going down to London and showing up at the doorstep of Eleanor Bone's place the Brackenburn Rest Home that she runs.

From a transcription of the letter:

Letterhead Brackenburn Rest Home 4th November 1962

My Dear Gerald,

I am sending this to Castletown as I guess you are back by now. No dear, I didn't tell you the wrong programme – it was Huw Thoma "Here and Now" 6.45p.m. Tuesday 30th October, but it was only shown in London I believe. You will be pleased to know that it went very well – everybody said what a dignified performance it was. I don't think that Jack saw it, I know Fay didn't. I am glad your programme went well, I would love to have seen it, but that was Northern only

Yes dear, the "New Zealander" as you call him arrived on my doorstep last Tuesday. Unfortunately I was out and one of my staff asked him in to wait. I might add that he arrived complete with bags etc. Well, of course, the moment I set eyes on him I could see he wasn't a man to be trusted and his accent struck me as typical Australian – having met a number of them in the past. I was even less impressed when he decided to spit into the fire! Bill was furious that the Crowthers gave him this address. I believe they did the same thing to Olwen once. They really must not do that sort of thing – most indiscreet. Anyway, I gave him a meal and he sat for a couple of hours and then I made it quite clear

that I could not possibly help him into the Craft and I did not pass him on to any other long-suffering person. I am quite able to dispose of people I don't want around without passing the buck to others. I also made a few tactful enquiries and this man is an Australian who has been kicking around town for a couple of years, trying to get in on the fringe of things. He is know to Sal of all people. He told me that he was in Perth for

four weeks, staying with Olwen for two of them – I wouldn't have him here for more than two hours, I can assure you.

"Geralds Friend" who wrote the letter in "Fate" is none other than our dear Tex. He put in the advert in the name of Artemis, and has had three replies to date. Darling have you had any letters to pass on to me? I need some attractive females, so please do your best. John is now completely in agreement with me over Sal. He had a feeling that I was predjudiced by my pre-knowledge of her peculiarities. Now he know I was quite right in my decision.

Did you hear that programme by that disgusting man Williamson? He stated that witches make a lot of money helping people. From his angle we sounded like an American protection racket. He won't come to any good.

I am going away for a few days break. My very sick old lady died last Tuesday and her daughter game me L 20 to have a little rest and holiday after the hard work I had put in. I haven't quite made up my mind where to go. I don't know if you are home or not. I may make my way to Cumberland. Have we any contacts up there that I could visit?

Well dear, no more now, hope to hear from you soon. Much love from Bill and myself.

Blessed be, Ray.

Could this be Graham Moss?

My theory is that at this point of time Graham Moss wanted to become an initiate of the Gardnerian Wicca to find out what kind of rituals that they were using.

He would have to go to the United Kingdom as there probably were no covens in Australia at the time.

After Graham Moss was promoted to the post of Electoral Register, he probably had time to take a vacation.

From the letter, it sounds like the New Zealander was rebuffed in his attempt to join a coven. He went to Perth in Scotland and stayed at Monique Wilson's (Olwen) place for a couple weeks. He went to the Crowther's coven in Sheffield, England and they sent him to London to Eleanor Bone's place the Brackenburn Rest Home that she runs.

Again providing that this was Graham Moss, it would explain how he would later got to know Sylvia Tatham. Monique Wilson later sent Sylvia Tatham to New Zealand to start a coven there. Graham Moss was probably still corresponding with Monique Wilson after his visit to Scotland. He probably was one of the early people to be initiated by Sylvia in Australia or New Zealand.

One point that suggest it was not Graham Moss, was Eleanor Bone's comment "I also made a few tactful enquiries and this man is an Australian who has been kicking around town for a couple of years, trying to get in on the fringe of things."

It could be possible that Eleanor Bone got information on the wrong person. Also, if the man was in London or its environs for two years, he would have a place to stay there.... So why would he be carrying his bags (luggages) to Eleanor Bone's place which is in London too? When considering the population of London and its environs at the time, it increases the chance of getting intel on the wrong person.

Also Graham Moss was planning to move to New Zealand as he later did. Hence the New Zealander with the Australian accent comment.

From Melissa Seims' research, she shared the following:

"Assuming this is Bill, we may wonder what his motives were for travelling halfway around the world and getting to know Gardner's witches in the UK. The answer may lie in the following letter from Bill Liddell to Australian witch, Simon Goodman, dated 21st August 1983:

My parent tradition [Old Style Craft] had authorised two of us to contact 'public witches' and the editors of various Craft magazines. Our terms of reference were to establish contact with representatives of the Revived Craft; to establish what 'forces' (or 'power') was associated with the various modern traditions; to investigate what they really were doing as opposed to their public image; and, where possible to present our side of the craft in publications. Where we associated with covens or individuals we had to deny categorically any Craft association, affiliation or ancestry. This was to ensure that we would be treated like your average neophyte for gradal and instruction purposes.

It would appear that Bill was under orders from his own Elders. Certainly, Eleanor's comments to Gardner describe a man on a mission!"

Interesting, as this enhance my belief that Graham Moss may have had another name (other than Bill Liddell) if he traveled to England. He is already shown to be quite an operative.

We will try to find out what name he may have used in going to England.

Bill Liddell wrote about events with people he knew directly and indirectly in England in his letters to Mike Howard and Pauline Lind.

There is a letter, dated ca. 1984, that Sylvia Tatham, in Australia, wrote to Bill Liddell. By that time he probably had moved from New Zealand to Australia. Bill Liddell then forwarded it to Mike Howard.

The content of the letter, of which I transcribed part of below, explains how she and Alex Sanders got their initiations. It also mentioned a Patricia of Long Eaton. That would be Patricia Kopinski.

This appeared in Julia Phillip's 2019 article, Secrets Revealed.

Part of the letter from Sylvia Tatham to Bill Liddell ca. 1984:

(From the quoted parts in the article by Julia Phillips)

"When Robert [Turner] and I were at Casteltown for our First Degrees, Robert (sic) Buckland and his wife were there for their Third Degrees. In conversation with the Bucklands, Lady Olwen ..."

Regarding Sanders' Craft status - he is a GARDNERIAN, as all revived Craft stems from old Gerald. The book "King of the Witches" is incorrect - Sanders was NOT initiated by his grandmother. He was initiated by the Maiden of Pat Crowther's Sheffield coven. Ask Robert Turner for confirmation of this.

The maiden of Pat Crowther's coven (also named Patricia) lived at Long Eaton, Derbyshire and, as she was sick o traveling to convene, she cought [sic] to form her own coven. I met Patricia through a friend at the office. She arranged for Sanders (who at that time lived in Manchester - he had done a laboring type of job in a chemical factory, but at that time worked as a book duster in the Egyptian section of the JOHN RYLANDS LIBRARY, Manchester) to initiate me, but FIRST PATRICIA HAD TO INITIATE ALEX !!! He brought his sword and athame over to Long Eaton to be consecrated and put into working order, so to speak.

Through Sanders I met Robert Turner (who later formed THE ORDER O THE CUBIC STONE with Theodore Howard, a Kabalist). According to Robert, the Sanders initiation was NOT VALID; he (ever a perfectionist) suggested we go to Castletown to be properly initiated by the Lady Olwen and Loic. After all, old Gerald initiated Lady Olwen, Lady Artemis, Doreen Valiente and, one wonders, did he initiate Pat Crowther? Or did Arnold initiate Pat Crowther?

Also Sanders copied his Book of Shadows from Robert's book - Robert had copied the Castletown Book. I copied the Castletown Book in its entirety with Olwen's blessing, as she was sending out her little Priestess to N. Z. to found a coven. The N. Z. coven was very dear to Olwen's heart, and I fear not achieving this ambition was a bitter blow to

her. But I cannot help what happened to my health, perhaps it was the climate and my Kharma.

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Letter from Bill Liddell to Mike Howard 5/6/1997 (5 June 1997):

"Andrew wants I put down details of Sylvia Tatham. (Knowing Andrew, I suspect that he is trying to prove that she never existed!)

Sylvia was born in Guatemala in the 1920s (? 1925 or 1927). Her maiden name was GAMBLE. Sylvia's father worked for the American Fruit Co, and I suspect he was American."

"Sylvia was employed as a legal secretary in Nottingham. She commuted from Nottingham to Manchester when Sanders started playing at being a witch[.] She was accompanied by "Pat who had married a Polish [---]-serviceman." (This just has to be the Pat Kopanski cited by Aidan Kelly. Neither Kelly nor Valiente mentions Sylvia when discussing Sanders' beginnings!)"

Both Sylvia and Pat were enamoured of Sanders but Pat was the favoured one. (Sanders must have had something going for him).

Pat supposedly wrote to Pat Crowther advising that Sanders had received the Gardnerian 1st. (This according to Kelly).

Sylvia claimed that Sanders had sighted Turner's Gardnerian BoS and written up the First Degree ritual. She was anxious to put all the blame on Robert Turner. I chose to believe that Sylvia herself let Sanders copy her Gardnerian BoS to curry favour with Alex, and spite Pat."

"Sylvia and Pat were with Alex before the advent of Maxine Morris."

Letter from Bill Liddell to Mike Howard 16th December 2001:

"Red Pat was a busy redhead according to Sylvia."

"To the best of my knowledge, Sylvia was never a schoolteacher. She worked in Nottingham as a typists in a legal practice. In New Zealand and Australia Sylvia was a Typists or a secretary. However Sylvia made an art form of being pedantic and [frissy or fussy?]. She would have made a good role model for a Victorian schoolmarm. I can understand how Sylvia's Circle performance would have grated on a teenager. (It grated on me and everyone else who worked with her) Every movement and inflection had to be perfect and put right. Sylvia was a perfectionist in every sense of that word."

"Sylvia assured me that she knew Jack Bracelin. She spoke very highly of Rae Bone. I still don't know if she ever worked with Jack or Rae. She always gave the impression that she had worked in a circle with them."

Letter from Bill Liddell to Mike Howard 14/6/1984 (14 June 1984)

"P.S. Sylvia says that she ran "a small coven" in Nottingham with Robert Turner!"

Letter from Bill Liddell to Mike Howard 23/7/1997 - 3 (23 July 1997):

"You have my full permission to state in the last article of the Gerald Gardner saga that Sylvia Tatham was in Sanders' Manchester coven in the earl[y] days, and that she was subsequently my Gardnerian High Priestess and common-in-law wife in New Zealand. She was also recognized by Sanders as an Alexandrian High Priestess!

I am hoping that somebody who knew Sylvia, or knew of her, will come forward with information. It is a great pity that "Rae" Bone, Jack Bracelin and Monique Wilson are deceased."

"It also occurs to me that Patricia Crowther might know something about Sylvia's background given that Pat Kopanski (one of her coven members) accompanied Sylvia when they journeyed from Nottingham to Manchester to be with Sanders. Sylvia worked in a legal office in Nottingham. One of her husbands was a Les Camm, who was born and lived in Nottingham. I never asked whether Camm was the first or second husband. Sylvia chose to be addressed as Mrs. Tatham when dealing with the Alexandrian coven."

Letter from Bill Liddell to Pauline Lind of New Zealand, dated 5 July 2004: Page 1

"No doubt Ron [Hutton] has mentioned that Sylvia, Pat Kopanski, and Alex were initiated by "Medea" and her husband. It is quite untrue when Patricia Crowther alleges that Alex Sanders was not a legitimate witch because Pat, his supposed initiator, only held the First Degree. Sanders received his Third Degree from Sylvia Tatham!"

Page 2

"None of the Craft authors has ever mentioned Sylvia. Neither Doreen Valiente nor Aidan Kelly mentioned her when discussing Sanders' claims. Pat never mentioned Sylvia when speaking to reporters about Sanders' coven; and thereby hangs a tale.

Both Pat and Sylvia were really in love with Sanders. (Alex had great personal magnetism!) Sylvia was furious when Sanders agreed to marry Pat. Pat was Sanders' High Priestess because of her engagement to Alex.

Doreen Valiente erroneously claimed that Alex Sanders visited Gerald Gardner on the Isle of Man. Alex never left England! It was Sylvia who went to the Isle of Man. Whatever aspersions have been cast on Medea's Gardnerian qualifications --- and there have been some --- Sylvia was welcomed by the Lady Olwen. (Monique Wilson)

Monique Wilson accepted Sylvia as a Gardnerian Second and had her husband (LORIC) raise Sylvia to the Gardnerian Third. So Sylvia's Gardnerian linage was not only kosher --- it was impeccable. Gardner initiated Monique, who initiated "LORIC" (Campbell "Scotty" Wilson), who initiated Sylvia Tatham ("Isis")

Sylvia gave Alex the Gardnerian Third, actually rather than symbolically. The "power" had been physically passed to her by Loric. Her Craft authority derived from Gardner himself.

Mike Howard kindly sent me a Craft magazine interview with Maxine Sanders. She stated that when she first met Alex his High Priestess was a woman named Sylvia. (I may still have a copy)

Alex dumped poor Sylvia for Maxine. Sylvia was devastated and wanted to run away. Alex appointed her his High Priestess in Australia."

Incidentally, Ron Hutton very kindly sent me a copy of Pat's letter to Gerald Gardner wherein she explained how Alex, she and her friend Sylvia were initiated by Medea and her husband.

Sylvia Tatham should receive full recognition for her role in legitimizing the Alexandrian tradition."

~ July 1964

Robert Turner and Sylvia Tatham were initiated by the Wilsons at Castletown, Isle of Man in July 1964. They saw the Bucklands there.

From the article, Secrets Revealed by Julia Phillip (2019):

From the letter Sylvia Tatham wrote to Bill Liddell in ca. 1984.

"When Robert [Turner] and I were at Casteltown for our First Degrees, Robert (sic) Buckland and his wife were there for their Third Degrees. In conversation with the Bucklands, Lady Olwen ..."

From the article, "The Riddle of Liddell and a Gander into Sanders", by Melissa Seims, 2023:

"From this snippet we learn that Sylvia also had a first degree (and presumably a second) from the Wilson's. Due to the mention of the Buckland's, this first degree must have happened in July 1964 as that was the first time that both of the Bucklands' visited the Isle of Man. This was after Gerald Gardner had died and Monique and Scotty were living in Castletown on the Isle. Knowing how the early Wica used to operate, I would imagine it would not have taken long for Sylvia to be elevated.

Maxine Sanders claims that the Sylvia that was Alex's High Priestess was not Sylvia Tatham. There are mounting evidences that it was the same person. And she made a comment about the character of Sylvia the H.P. in her book.

From Melissa Seims' research, she share the following:

"A Sylvia is mentioned in Maxine Sander's 2007 biography Firechild. Maxine wrote: Alex and Sylvia's group was the mother coven to eight full covens and several smaller ones scattered all over the country particularly in the north of England....

My first training circle was a disaster. Sylvia, the High Priestess, looked like a Sunday school teacher – very prim and proper. I had been told she demanded high standards of concentration from her students."

See how Bill Liddell describe Sylvia Tatham in his letter.

Letter from Bill Liddell to Mike Howard 16th December 2001:

"Sylvia made an art form of being pedantic and [frissy or fussy?]. She would have made a good role model for a Victorian schoolmarm. From the Letter from Bill Liddell to Pauline Lind of New Zealand, dated 5 July 2004: Page 1

"I reached New Zealand in January 1963."

~ Revisiting the timeline of 1962 to 1963

30 July 1962 - Graham Alfred Irwin Moss was appointed as Electoral Register for Barkly in Northern Territory, Australia.

4 November 1962 - the "New Zealander" with the Australian accent is in England trying to join a coven. As the letter is an after the fact reporting from Eleanor Bone, on Nov. 4th, the visit of the "New Zealander" probably took place in October 1962.

January 1963 - Bill Liddell says in the letter to Pauline Lind (2004) that he reached New Zealand in January 1963.

1963 - Electoral Roll of Australia listed him at Tennant Creek in Northern Territory. Usually, directories, phone books, and electoral rolls is prepared from data that they have current from the previous year.

In other words, the 1963 electoral rolls would be from what information they had in 1962.

So in speculations..... in Graham Moss case, it was old data on him. He was already gone from Tenant Creek.

18 September 1963 - Graham Alfred Irwin Moss was dismissed from his post. Speculations:

That Graham Moss wanted to move to New Zealand and form a coven there. So after he got promoted, he soon took a long leave of absence from his job to go to England and then go to New Zealand.

The officials then seeing that he did not return when he said he would get back, then the officials dismissed him from the post.

Again, from the 1963 Australia Electoral Rolls:

As you can see he was living in a NTA Hostel in Tennant Creek.

From Wikipedia:

"A hostel is a form of low-cost, short-term shared sociable lodging where guests can rent a bed, usually a bunk bed in a dormitory..."

That shows that he was a man that didn't established roots in Tennant Creek, he knew he was going elsewhere. And that he didn't have a whole house full of things. He knew how to survive with just a few items and be ready to move on.

Further speculations -

Seeing that Bill Liddell was an effective operative, he probably had another identity when he went to England and New Zealand in the beginning.

We are currently still looking for clues to support that.

~ 1966

There is an Incoming Passenger Card on Ernest William Liddell (aka G. A. I. Moss) from his trip he made on 4 November 1966 from Wellington, New Zealand to Australia. His destination was Burnside, Adelaide in South Australia. He was taking a month holiday.

It is possible that he then went from South Australia to Perth, Western Australia to see Sylvia Tatham. She arrived from England to Perth, W. A. in 1965.



~ 1969 to early 1970's

A letter that Sylvia Tatham wrote to Bill Liddell which was then forwarded to Mike Howard.

In this letter it shows that Sylvia Tatham was growing disappointed at her asthma issues and of the results in trying to get members for the coven. She finds that the New Zealanders didn't trust outsiders much.

Letter from ST to BL forwarded to MH 24/1/1984 (24 January 1984):

"In N.Z. the asthma was starting. Please do not blame yourself. I realized something was wrong and I felt rather apprehensive. You had written to CASTLETOWN for a Priestess, the Lady Olwyn sent me with a copy of the "Shadows." I have always believed Olwyn caused the asthma because her annoyance at not acquiring an N.Z. coven. You recall she kept my measure and had the means. I believe she cursed me with KIWIS!! Where ever I go there are Kiwis who reject outsiders."

Letter from Bill Liddell to Mike Howard 5/6/1997 (5 June 1997):

"Incidently, my dates for the Prediction of Fate article may be wrong. I lived with Sylvia from the late 60s to the early 1970s. I have post remembered that we were still together when the [mysterious?] and elusive article was published."

The following two letters are mostly about the coven activities after Sylvia Tatham left and went back to Australia.

Letter from Bill Liddell to Mike Howard 9/7/1997 - 2 (9 July 1997):

"Alex Sanders appointed Sylvia Tatham his Alexandrian High Priestess for Australia." Sylvia advertised for coven members in Australian newspapers. We corresponded and Sylvia came to N. Z. to live with me. I was her High Priest. Sylvia had a Gardnerian BoS and an Alexandrian BoS. Both books had the rituals for the Three Degrees! Sylvia and I split-up after some years. I wrote to Alex Sanders that Sylvia was back in Australia and I was in New Zealand minus a High Priestess. Maxine Sanders replied in a brief note on blue note-paper (She did mention that she hated writing letters) Maxine assured me that Alex remembered Sylvia, and that he appointed me his High Priest for New Zealand. (It is this logical to assume that Alex accepted Sylvia as a Third Degree witch!) There was only one proviso to my appointment: I had to wait for a High Priestess named Sue who would shortly leave England to settle in New Zealand. Nothing transpired with the ill-fated N. Z. coven because "Sue" never arrived, and I had no sanction to operate without a High Priestess. Perhaps a year or so later I received an extraordinary letter from two of Maxine's little helpers. These young hopefuls were organizing the Alexandrian movement in overseas countries - by astral initiations! (I recall mentioning this couple to you years ago, but did not name them.)

This was probably after Alex and Maxine had separated. Sue and "Rusty" Russell-Gough assured me that because I had

no Alexandrian High Priestess they would not be satisfied unless they gave me each of the Alexandrian Degrees from scratch, as it were. My initial was to tell them where to put their tools. However, I had a young couple who were breaking their necks to become Alexandrian witches. They had been patiently for the High Priestess appointed by Maxine to arrive.

Sue and "Rusty" Russell-Gough arranged for an "Astral" first degree initiation for Kathy and Ivan Boyes. I was to be the initiator. It appears that Sue and "Rusty" were supervising many foreign covens and handing out "astral" initiations.

I perserved with this travesty because of Kathy and Ivan.

To my utter amazement, one of the "guardians" of the Pickingill covens entered the circle and placed a necklace around my throat.

This circumstance convinced me that Sylvia did have a Gardnerian initiation as she claimed, and Gardner had been induced into the old style Craft as my Brethren always claimed.

Sue and "Rusty" were delighted when I reported back, and then claimed that we were now first degree witches by their reckoning. My Elders were furious at my account, and told me to sever all connections with the Russell-Goughs. I accordingly wrote to Sue and "Rusty" and thanked for initiating Kathy and Ivan, but declined any further contact with the Alexandrians. My letter explained my previous Hereditary affiliation. (The Russell-Goughs can confirm this if they kept files of their overseas "students"!)"

Letter from Bill Liddell to Pauline Lind of New Zealand, dated 5 July 2004:

Page 1

"I reached New Zealand in January 1963."

"Sylvia reached New Zealand in either 1969 or 1970."

Page 3

"Alex dumped poor Sylvia for Maxine. Sylvia was devastated and wanted to run away. Alex appointed her his High Priestess in Australia.

Sylvia and I corresponded and she removed to New Zealand. She became my hand-fast wife. Sylvia gave me the three Gardnerian degrees and the three Alexandrian degrees. The Alexandrian First and Second are almost identical with the Gardnerian originals. Sanders had to very careful. He couldn't afford to be accused of plagiarism. Alex changed some correspondences, and parts of the Third Degree to continue his charade. Sylvia was disgusted with the candidates who applied to join our coven. She rejected the lot and returned to"

Page 4

"Australia. Sylvia was going to have a coven by hook or by crook. I remained in New Zealand as I had my career here.

I wrote to Alex Sanders and explained how Sylvia had decamped. Maxine eventually wrote back and announced that Alex had appointed me his High Priest in New Zealand. I was not to initiate anybody until a High Priestess could be sent from England. A woman named Sue was supposedly on her way. However, Sue decided to stay in Australia which had been her first port of call. I forgot all about the Alexandrians. Shortly afterwards, a couple named Russell-Gough wrote to me and authorized me to found an Alexandrian coven. It appears that Maxine had deputized Sue and "Rusty" Russell-Gough to found overseas covens in her name. They assured me they had founded covens in Iceland, the Netherlands, Canada and America. They travelled "Astrally" to these countries.

It appears that Maxine passed letters from overseas correspondents to the Russell-Goughs. Sue and Rusty would nominate a leader from that country and arrange for aspiring witches to contact him or her. A time would be arranged for the astral ceremony. The nominated leader --- whether male or female --- would cast the circle. He or she would initiate candidates of both sexes. This was apparently acceptable." Page 5

"Both Sue and Rusty would be present in the circle in their astral body. Sue would overshadow a nominated female leader when she initiated a man. Rusty would overshadow a nominated male leader when he initiated a woman. It is hardly surprising that the Alexandrian tradition spread so quickly!

I went through this farce with a couple who contacted me, having advised Sue and Rusty that I would do it once, and only for them to have a nucleus for their New Zealand coven. I then told Sue and Rusty what they could do with their astral initiations! Sue and Rusty said previously stated that they knew nothing about me, and had no knowledge of Sylvia Tatham. Consequently, I had to go through the process that they used for other nominated leaders."

Bill Liddell then described in the letter about the kind of candidates that were trying to get in their coven. Most of them were turned away for various reasons.

Letter from Bill Liddell to Pauline Lind of New Zealand, dated 5 July 2004:

Page 1

"Queensland, Australia.

5th July 2004.

Dear Pauline,

Thank you for supplying an address.

I really do not believe I can be of much help. There is no possible way that I could estimate the number of Witches or Pagans in New Zealand in the 1960s or 1970s. There may have been several small groups operating. Unfortunately, these people kept very much to themselves. It is extremely doubtful whether they had a legitimate provenance."

Page 5

"Although I am unable to help you with your research, I can regale you with accounts of the witches I met in the 1970s.

There was a Canadian who really believed that he turned into a werewolf every" Page 6

"New Year's eve. He had also been taken --- a' la George Adamski --- to Venus. This was the guy that the Russell-Goughs asked me to initiate.

Another candidate was a sixteen - year - old girl who had an ulterior motive for joining an Alexandrian coven. She wanted to learn black spells in order to kill her step-father! I was able to dissuade her from becoming a witch, and sent her packing.

Needless to say, one plausible young man put it around that he had been sexually initiated by his grandmother. This so-called Hereditary rituals were copied word-forword from the Alexandrian Book of Shadows! And he wasn't the only poseur to make the claim.

My favourite was an enterprising young tough who had joined a black magic coven in Melbourne. He approached me because he had been assured that Alex Sanders was a Satanist. This guy soon ended up in prison. However, with perverse tenacity he soon re-invented himself as a professional astrologer and a witch magister. I understand that he had his own radio show.

No one should overlook Bruce, the self-styled 17th Marquis de Bourbon. This character was mooted to be the most powerful black magician since Crowley. He basked in the adulation of his Rotorua-based coven. There were spasmodic newspaper"

"reports about sacrifices in a Rotorua forest. The usual media hype mentioned both human and animal sacrifices.

I met Bruce on several occasions and had several phone conversations with his teen-age High Priestess. She assured me that they drunk the blood of the animals they sacrificed. This friendly little creature also explained that she enjoyed copulating with an alsation on their Alexandrian altar (Poor Alex Sanders. He would turn in his grave if he knew how his black magic antics had affected some so-called "witches")

Bruce assured me that he corresponded with Sanders. He wanted us to exchange reciprocal initiations. My answer was unprintable! When I last saw the 17th Marquis de Bourbon he was eking out an existence as a part-time barman in an Auckland hotel.

I can only hope that the Craft and Pagan scenes in New Zealand have dramatically improved since the 1970s.

Very interesting letter. After reading it, it made me sit back and think about it..... and the theme song for the show "The X-Files" started playing in my head several times...

I then sent a message to Jimahl Di Fiosa (the author of A Coin for the Ferryman, 2015) to ask about whether the Sanders had done some astral initiations in those early years. He sent the following reply.

From the Messenger text of October 12, 2022:

"In my opinion, an astral initiation into Alexandrian witchcraft - especially when viewed from today's perspective - would be considered a highly unusual and potentially invalid practice. Mostly because in witchcraft such initiations are most effective when performed on the physical plane. However, in the world of witchcraft, nothing is impossible so it may have occurred at the time. Who can say but those who were present?"

At the time, 1960's to 1970's, New Zealand was still a remote place. It was very expensive to travel there by plane and lesser but still expensive by ship. Even calling long distance was expensive.

And as the letter shows, getting a High Priestess to volunteer to go to and settle in New Zealand proved not easy.

In the early 1970's, Alex and Maxine Sanders were probably looking at other ways to initiate people at these remote places in the world and probably tried some astral initiations.

Maxine Sanders is known to have mentioned in several in places that she had done astral projections when she was younger.

At this time in the 1970's, Alex and Maxine separated in 1971 and Maxine was pregnant and the child was born in 1972. So as the letters stated, it looks like Sue and "Rusty" Russell-Gough were running the day to day business in London.

Nobody in the upper floors yet come forward to confess that it was done. So at this point, all we can say is that it is believed by some that the astral initiations probably was mainly a project that was done by "Rusty" and Sue Russell-Gough.

The one letter above mentioned that the Russell-Goughs founded Alexandrians covens through astral initiations on candidates in Iceland, The Netherlands, Canada, and America and then in New Zealand.

Hopefully, in the future, some more information will come out about the astral initiations that may have been done by the Alexandrians.... "The truth is out there".

We have since gotten two follow-up comments to the subject of astral initiations being conducted by the early Alexandrians in the London coven.

From Jimahl Di Fiosa, via Messenger, July 6, 2023 Thursday: Hi William,

... I had forwarded the link to your Alex research to a dear friend formerly known in the Craft as Celia who you will remember was married to Rusty at the time of the London coven. With regard to the alleged astral initiations:

She would like to set the record straight that neither Rusty or Sue ever mentioned astral initiations to her and she (Celia) would definitely not have approved of such a thing nor was she ever involved in this type of activity.

From a person who wish to remain anonymous, December 2022:

"So my sort of confirmation of astral initiation came from someone who recalls both Sue and Celia. This person, basically said to me they did hear of astral initiations, but Celia didn't like them so they don't recall Celia ever doing one whilst they were with the London Coven."

The information from the coven member supports the claim from Celia that she never had done astral initiations. So if astral initiations was done, it happened earlier at the time of Sue and Rusty before Celia came in.

Hopefully we will have more people come forward with information on the subject and other subjects of the history of Alex Sanders.

~ Maxine Sanders' use of blue notepaper

Maxine Sanders did used blue notepapers when writing letters back in the early 1970's. From the article, "The Riddle of Liddell and a Gander into Sanders", by Melissa Seims, 2023:

[page 12-13]

"Liddell wrote to Mike Howard that this letter from Maxine, written on blue notepaper was borrowed by the American Witch Leo Martello and never returned. Whilst I have made efforts to trace it, it currently remains missing. However, I did discover that

Maxine had sent out letters on blue notepaper; occult writer, Clive Harper, received one in 1971 (around the same time that she would have sent this one to Bill)."

Further research showed that they were real people that were members of the Alexandrians. His name was Grenville Keith "Rusty" Russell-Gough.

Russell-Gough, who prefers to be called Rusty, said: "I change the oil every day when I come in from work. While that candle burns, I still believe."

Celia was wearing a long scarlet dress.

She said she was the high priestess. Then turning to Rusty, in tee shirt and dark trousers, she said: "I rule the coven, I have the last word."

~ Who were Kathy and Ivan Boyse?

The search for the Boyse was difficult. They did not show up in the available New Zealand records that are available online at the genealogy sites.

While there are entries of people with those names living separately, there were no Ivan and Kathy Boyse listed together in the New Zealand Electoral Rolls of the 1960's to 1970's.

I found that the name Ivan Boyse was not a common name. So I expanded my search for Ivan Boyse worldwide and there were only a few entries of Ivan Boyse on the internet. I then came across few entries concerning an Ivan Boyse who claimed that he was taken by a UFO in the 1960 or 1961.

But I find that he was living in Canada so I dismissed it as not the right Ivan Boyse.

A month later, Melissa Seims found references of a Polly Lind of New Zealand who wrote an article on the Pagan scene in New Zealand of the 1970's. Melissa wrote to her and found that she had a letter written from Bill Liddell to her in 2004. Polly sent Melissa a copy of it.

In the letter that Bill Liddell wrote, he mentioned that the man who was initiated by Sue and "Rusty" Russell-Gough was a Canadian and that he claimed he was taken to Venus on a UFO. So the Ivan Boyse that I came across earlier was the correct person.

It turned out that Ivan Boyse was in Auckland, New Zealand in 1972 to attend a UFO convention that was held there. He then liked New Zealand and they decided to live there in Auckland afterwards.

~ 19 October 1960

Ivan Boyse wrote an account of what happened to him with the UFO incidence of 19 October 1960. His story was published in the magazine, Ancient Astronauts issue of May 1977.

From the magazine, Ancient Astronauts, May 1977:

On Board an Ancient Astronaut Spacecraft!

"Today, even as a UFO researcher and ancient astronaut theorist, I still have to force myself to talk openly of the events that transpired within a 48-hour span in the middle of October 1960. Only the evidence of later events convinced me that the contact had actually occurred.

At the time I was a 15-year-old student who had never heard of UFOs. Then on the evening of October 19, my world was drastically altered. At four-thirty in the afternoon I arrived home from school and proceeded to do my homework for a few hours, until a very strange feeling came over me. I had the overpowering urge to get up and go

outside. The feeling soon became a compulsion. I went out around seven o'clock and walked in a southerly direction to the Queen Elizabeth Highway. I was being pulled by an unknown power to and equally unknown destination!

Before I knew it, I had hitched a ride out toward the Welland area of Ontario. Then I found myself walking into the bleak countryside to the north of the highway....."

In 1972 in New Zealand, a UFO convention gathered 600 people, ranging from skeptics to proponents, all talking about their respective theories and speculations. A newspaper reported on the convention, and amidst the brief presentation of various point of views held by the speakers, mentioned one I. Boyes, aged 26, a Canadian now living in Auckland.

This young man was promoting a group known as "Integral Structures Systems Utopia".

The group claimed to have been formed by the Intergalactic Administration and to be in contact with people from other worlds. It also claims to have been given details of how to build a flying saucer.

The group had plans to "bring a space fleet from Taurus by 1979 to stop mankind from destroying itself," to help form a world government under the "biocratic" system and abolish the monetary system.

Mr. Boyes later told the reporter that he had been telepathically attracted to a spacecraft 100 miles from his home in Welland, Canada, in 1961. He claimed he had hitchhiked the distance and was later taken on board the circular craft, about 100 feet in diameter, which was manned by three crewmen who came "from the coniferous age of earth". They had time-traveled to the present, claimed Boyle.

And that's all there is to it."

EXTENSIVE FIRE AT STRATFORD. --- On Tuesday night last between the hours of eight and nine o'clock, an extensive destruction of property by fire took place in the houses of Mr. Moss, hairdresser, Mr. Kennedy, salesman, Mr. Ridley, shoemaker, Mr. Biddell, tailor, and Mr. Maynard, grocer, High-street, Stratford, which burn with the most fearful rapidly, and threatened destruction to the entire neighbourhood.

The parish engines were immediately procured and brought into use by a party of the K division of police, and messengers were despatched to London for the assistance of the fire brigade, many of whom with their engines, reached Stratford about ten o'clock, when, there being an excellent supply of water at hand for use, the fire was subdued, but not until the whole of Mr. Moss's stock and furniture had been consumed, and considerable damage the other houses already mentioned.

The fire broke out in the upper part of Mr. Moss's house but how it originated is not known. It is but justice to add, that but for the assistance afforded to the inhabitants by the omnibus drivers on the Stratford road during the raging of the fire, the loss of property would have been very great. The parties are insured in the Alliance and Imperial Fire Offices.



PART IV

The 2004 letter written by Bill Liddell to Pauline Lind. It is mentioned in sections above in Part I and again here in its entirely.

From the letter from Bill Liddell to Pauline Lind of New Zealand, dated 5 July 2004:

Queensland, Australia.

5th July 2004.

Dear Pauline,

Thank you for supplying an address.

I really do not believe I can be of much help. There is no possible way that I could estimate the number of Witches or Pagans in New Zealand in the 1960s or 1970s. There may have been several small groups operating. Unfortunately, these people kept very much to themselves. It is extremely doubtful whether they had a legitimate provenance.

I reached New Zealand in January 1963. Witchcraft was still illegal when I was inducted into the Traditional Craft in 1950. By birth and training I was taught never to discuss beliefs, or to admit to my persuasion.

Gerald Gardner and Alex Sanders have much to answer for, as it were. I have not read Ron Hutton's Triumph of the Moon, and cannot possibly know when he said I linked up with Sylvia Tatham.

Sylvia reached New Zealand in either 1969 or 1970. No doubt Ron has mentioned that Sylvia, Pat Kopanski, and Alex were initiated by "Medea" and her husband. It is quite untrue when Patricia Crowther alleges that Alex Sanders was not a legitimate witch because Pat, his supposed initiator, only held the First Degree. Sanders received his Third Degree from Sylvia Tatham!

None of the Craft authors has ever mentioned Sylvia. Neither Doreen Valiente nor Aidan Kelly mentioned her when discussing Sanders' claims. Pat never mentioned Sylvia when speaking to reporters about Sanders' coven; and thereby hangs a tale.

Both Pat and Sylvia were really in love with Sanders. (Alex had great personal magnetism!) Sylvia was furious when Sanders agreed to marry Pat. Pat was Sanders' High Priestess because of her engagement to Alex.

Doreen Valiente erroneously claimed that Alex Sanders visited Gerald Gardner on the Isle of Man. Alex never left England! It was Sylvia who went to the Isle of Man. Whatever aspersions have been cast on Medea's Gardnerian qualifications --- and there have been some --- Sylvia was welcomed by the Lady Olwen. (Monique Wilson)

Monique Wilson accepted Sylvia as a Gardnerian Second and had her husband (LORIC) raise Sylvia to the Gardnerian Third. So Sylvia's Gardnerian linage was not only kosher --- it was impeccable. Gardner initiated Monique, who initiated "LORIC" (Campbell "Scotty" Wilson), who initiated Sylvia Tatham ("Isis")

It is quite wrong to say that Alex Sanders had not received his Third, He received a clandestine (?) initiation from Sylvia Tatham. Alex clung to the ridiculous yarn that he had been initiated by his grandmother; one supposes he had to keep

face.

Sylvia returned to England from the Isle of Man and confronted Alex Sanders with an ultimatum: dump Pat if you want your Third. Pat left the coven and Sylvia became Sanders' High Priestess. Sylvia gave Alex the Gardnerian Third, actually rather than symbolically. The "power" had been physically passed to her by Loric. Her Craft authority derived from Gardner himself.

Mike Howard kindly sent me a Craft magazine interview with Maxine Sanders. She stated that when she first met Alex his High Priestess was a woman named Sylvia. (I may still have a copy)

Alex dumped poor Sylvia for Maxine. Sylvia was devastated and wanted to run away. Alex appointed her his High Priestess in Australia.

Sylvia and I corresponded and she removed to New Zealand. She became my hand-fast wife. Sylvia gave me the three Gardnerian degrees and the three Alexandrian degrees. The Alexandrian First and Second are almost identical with the Gardnerian originals. Sanders had to very careful. He couldn't afford to be accused of plagiarism. Alex changed some correspondences, and parts of the Third Degree to continue his charade.

Sylvia was disgusted with the candidates who applied to join our coven. She rejected the lot and returned to

Australia. Sylvia was going to have a coven by hook or by crook. I remained in New Zealand as I had my career here.

I wrote to Alex Sanders and explained how Sylvia had decamped. Maxine eventually wrote back and announced that Alex had appointed me his High Priest in New Zealand. I was not to initiate anybody until a High Priestess could be sent from England. A woman named Sue was supposedly on her way. However, Sue decided to stay in Australia which had been her first port of call. I forgot all about the Alexandrians.

Shortly afterwards, a couple named Russell-Gough wrote to me and authorized me to found an Alexandrian coven. It appears that Maxine had deputized Sue and "Rusty" Russell-Gough to found overseas covens in her name. They assured me they

had founded covens in Iceland, the Netherlands, Canada and America. They travelled "Astrally" to these countries.

It appears that Maxine passed letters from overseas correspondents to the Russell-Goughs. Sue and Rusty would nominate a leader from that country and arrange for aspiring witches to contact him or her. A time would be arranged for the astral ceremony. The nominated leader --- whether male or female --- would cast the circle. He or she would initiate candidates of both sexes. This was apparently acceptable.

Both Sue and Rusty would be present in the circle in their astral body. Sue would overshadow a nominated female leader when she initiated a man. Rusty would overshadow a nominated male leader when he initiated a woman. It is hardly surprising that the Alexandrian tradition spread so quickly!

I went through this farce with a couple who contacted me, having advised Sue and Rusty that I would do it once, and only for them to have a nucleus for their New Zealand coven. I then told Sue and Rusty what they could do with their astral initiations! Sue and Rusty said previously stated that they knew nothing about me, and had no knowledge of Sylvia Tatham. Consequently, I had to go through the process that they used for other nominated leaders. Incidentally, Ron Hutton very kindly sent me a copy of Pat's letter to Gerald Gardner wherein she explained how Alex, she and her friend Sylvia were initiated by Medea and her husband.

Sylvia Tatham should receive full recognition for her role in legitimizing the Alexandrian tradition.

Although I am unable to help you with your research, I can regale you with accounts of the witches I met in the 1970s.

There was a Canadian who really believed that he turned into a werewolf every Page 6

New Year's eve. He had also been taken --- a' la George Adamski --- to Venus. This was the guy that the Russell-Goughs asked me to initiate.

Another candidate was a sixteen - year - old girl who had an ulterior motive for joining an Alexandrian coven. She wanted to learn black spells in order to kill her stepfather! I was able to dissuade her from becoming a witch, and sent her packing.

Needless to say, one plausible young man put it around that he had been sexually initiated by his grandmother. This so-called Hereditary rituals were copied word-forword from the Alexandrian Book of Shadows! And he wasn't the only poseur to make the claim.

My favourite was an enterprising young tough who had joined a black magic coven in Melbourne. He approached me because he had been assured that Alex Sanders was a Satanist. This guy soon ended up in prison. However, with perverse tenacity he soon re-invented himself as a professional astrologer and a witch magister. I understand that he had his own radio show.

No one should overlook Bruce, the self-styled 17th Marquis de Bourbon. This character was mooted to be the most powerful black magician since Crowley. He basked in the adulation of his Rotorua-based coven. There were spasmodic newspaper

reports about sacrifices in a Rotorua forest. The usual media hype mentioned both human and animal sacrifices.

I met Bruce on several occasions and had several phone conversations with his teen-age High Priestess. She assured me that they drunk the blood of the animals they sacrificed. This friendly little creature also explained that she enjoyed copulating with an alsation on their Alexandrian altar (Poor Alex Sanders. He would turn in his grave if he knew how his black magic antics had affected some so-called "witches")

Bruce assured me that he corresponded with Sanders. He wanted us to exchange reciprocal initiations. My answer was unprintable! When I last saw the 17th Marquis de Bourbon he was eking out an existence as a part-time barman in an Auckland hotel.

I can only hope that the Craft and Pagan scenes in New Zealand have dramatically improved since the 1970s.
